Meredith Helping

The Youth Leadership Academy, a program about the youth becoming leaders... seemed pretty straight forward when I filled out my application. I was wrong. Before YLA my idea of a leader was the kid calling the shots, or the kid coming up with the best ideas, but after Camp and our sessions I've come to realize it's so much more than that.

YLA Camp completely took me out of my element; I was surrounded by faces that knew nothing of me or me of them. From the moment we did those awkward introductions where I told you all I wanted to go to New Zealand because that's where Lord of the Rings was filmed, we began learning bits and pieces of each other. Camp challenged me in ways I've never been challenged before. We were asked to do some seemingly impossible tasks so that we could feel that awesome moment of victory that brought us all together. I mean I've physically never been closer to people till I was pulling them over a wall by their belt or carrying them in a stretcher over logs and through tunnels like a marine. By the way, I'm going to apologize once again to whoever carried me because I know I was heavy. We became closer and closer and shared some of our darkest moments with each other, and I cried along side a group of kids who only hours before were strangers to me. We left camp with a new group of best friends in whom we could trust. All of us are so different but we have one thing in common: we all are leaders in different forms and we all aspire to use our leadership skills to do things we may have never considered doing until camp.

Our sessions after camp were so spread out and we spent so much time apart but that didn't matter. Every time we returned to a session we left with a new piece of ourselves. We learned about our personalities with the Meyer's Briggs test, we learned about choosing our attitudes in the FISH session, so many different people came and spoke to us, each having their own story to tell and lesson to teach us. Everything we did or learned was connected and served a purpose. Even stacking loaded mousetraps, which at the time was a little terrifying, by the way, but taught us how vital teamwork is.

YLA taught me a leader is not there to promote themselves and their ideas, they are there to be the voice for those who are afraid to speak, or to be quiet and just listen when needed. A real leader helps those around them grow and develop their ideas. Leaders come in all shapes and sizes just look around the room.

I plan on using what I learned in YLA to get me where I need to go in life, and to be that person to go to when you need someone to guide you or just listen. YLA taught me how to be that person.

Thank you to all the people who have made this experience possible for us. It is one that we will benefit from for the rest of our lives.

You were chosen. I was chosen. Out of all the students in Madison County who applied to be in this program, the 36 of us were given this extraordinary opportunity, one that people everywhere envy. We only received this because of people like Pam and Bobbette, who have put hours into building this program for you and for me. Because of them we 36 went through camp together, the high and low ropes, learning how to work as a team with people who were once complete strangers, and are now best friends. We've been through sessions about different types of learning styles, fish markets, and playing with mousetraps. Because of them, all of you have created relationships with at least one person in this group that will last a lifetime, and it is because of them that we are here today.

YLA was never meant to be just about the memories or relationships, though. It's also about what we have learned about ourselves, and what we are going to do with it. During our discussion about this speech, Pam said she wanted me to let all of you know that this program was worth the money spent going towards it. I completely believe it is worth the money, but only if we move forward from here. The truth is, this isn't worth the money unless we take the foundation we've been given and build it up from there.

So what is that foundation?

What YLA taught me more than anything is about who I am, and to take time to turn my weaknesses into strengths. I'm learning how to change my world effectively. To be a leader is to be a servant, the lowest of the low, giving your all to the people you are serving. To be a leader is to love all people, delegate, develop community, and solve problems. To be a leader is to be a light in your neighborhoods, your schools, your cities, and this county.

How do we build from here?

This is the question I don't have an answer for yet. It takes some serious thought and determination from all of us, and will be different for all of us. The only thing I can do is encourage you to move forward. Take the next step, whatever that may be for you. Do something to change your world. The people who made this program have done their job, and I cannot thank them enough. But now the ball is in our court. It is time to move forward, remembering that we were chosen for a reason. Let's not waste our chance to be a change agent.

PURPOSE

The Leadership Academy of Madison County, sponsored by **Anderson University, Madison County Chamber and area businesses**, is an educational program designed to offer a probing study of community challenges and explore methods of meeting those challenges through the discovery and practice of 21st century leadership skills.

The Academy is committed to providing Madison County with a diverse, highly skilled and competent core of community servant-leaders/trustees.

PROGRAM

The Leadership Academy of Madison County is an annual program that meets from September to February. The program includes opening and closing retreats. **Attendance for the retreats is required** for those accepted into the Leadership Program.

The Academy believes servant-leaders/trustees are developed by exposing participants to the best practices for community leadership.

Through a format of lecture, open dialogue, on-site visitation and class interaction, a participant will be exposed to capacities of leadership such as visioning, collaboration, consensus, and community building activities. Class sessions, Youth Leadership Academy and service projects are coordinated through the Academy. Interfacing leadership skills with community entities strengthens the cadre of leaders for Madison County.

Applicants need to consider the time commitment of the Leadership Academy. As stated earlier, attendance is required for both the opening and closing retreats. Class participants are expected to attend all sessions except in the case of extreme emergency or illness.
