LIBBY PARKER yla '08 alumni serving our community

"How did I get myself into this?" "There is no way they can do this." "They are going to drop me." "I'm going to break a leg." "Why did I say yes to this"? These were the thoughts that ran through my head as I stood in front of a twelve-foot wall at Youth Leadership Academy opening retreat. I was there, for the weekend, to learn about myself, about my fellow classmates, and how to build a team. This particular exercise put everything we had learned to the test, we had to work together, trust each other, and listen to each other. As I look back on my life so far, this wall, but even more so YLA, was a defining moment in my leadership journey.

A few weeks before I found myself in front of that wall, I had received a letter stating that I had been accepted into the Youth Leadership Academy of Madison County. I had no idea what this would mean for me, a 16 year old high school student. What I didn't know then, but realize now, is that I was at a crossroads. I didn't fit. I didn't know how to find my place. I had a church that I was actively a part of, and I had friends, but I was loud, pushy, and a little too mouthy. Too quick to make and give my opinion, I was often seen as a judgmental, bossy girl. Somewhere in me was a leader, but those skills were underdeveloped and given no direction.

That day at YLA retreat, I faced the 12 foot wall, and allowed a group of teenagers to lift me over it. All of a sudden we, who had been defined by what school we went to, or what clubs we participated in, were now defined by what we had in common, the goal we needed to achieve, and the need for unity. I spent the next year learning about my gifts and talents, my leadership potential, and what it looks like to speak my opinion with less force and more wisdom. I also spent time getting to know my peers, who also found a place to learn, belong, and develop their leadership skills. I am proud to say that some of them are still great friends of mine.

Now I sit at my desk as Executive Director of Beauty for Ashes, a Transitional Home for Women in Alexandria, IN (www.alexbfa.org). Seven years ago, when I climbed over that wall, I never thought I would be given this type of opportunity. I can say now that my time with YLA was a large part in my journey to this position of leadership. The lessons I learned in YLA still influence my decisions today; to work together for a common goal, to listen to the wisdom around you, to work out of the gifts and talents you have and allow others to do the same. I am so thankful to Pam Shoot and the others who allow Youth Leadership Academy to make a lasting impact not only on my life, but many others.

PAM SHOOT program director's report

I have been around the block...many times! I started on my Leadership Journey in 1996 when I first participated in LAMC as a member of the class. By the time I graduated in 1997, I was hooked. I started with YLA that fall and the rest...is history.

When I started with YLA, there were 3 sessions, once a month and we graduated in December. Our first class was mainly from Anderson Community Schools and a few students from other schools systems in Madison County. There were 23 students in the class. Today, we have students from 9 different high schools, 12 sessions per year as well as many volunteer opportunities and there are 36 in our classes with a total of almost 600 graduates from YLA. Wow!

Initially, YLA was focused on what could we teach these young leaders. We then began a more focused journey of what can they learn and then give back. Currently, YLA has given back almost \$130,000.00 to organizations right here in Madison County that work with children and youth as well as countless hours of volunteer service. These are young people who know where the needs lie and work hard to meet those needs.

In 2008 I also began working with LAMC as Program Director. This was a whole new experience for me as the majority of my adult career had been spent working with youth. I have come to value this piece of my journey as well. Since the start of Anderson Leadership Academy to Anderson Area Leadership Academy to finally Leadership Academy of Madison County, there have been many changes. We started out as a "show & tell" program, with our leaders coming and talking with the classes about what was going on here in Anderson and Madison County. We later moved to a skills based program and started teaching how to be better leaders. We also started listening to our classes and things started changing here in Madison County.

Several years ago we started the Season of Giving Gift Fair which brings together a group of agencies and gets people to come on a specific day and make donations to those organizations as a way of making a real difference here in Madison County. This year's Gift Fair is coming up but to date we have helped agencies here in Madison County raise almost \$300,000.00. Our Leadership grads are out there, making a difference among those who need our help the most.

So what have I learned?

- · That people are innately good and caring
- That people will help but they need to be asked
- · That most people know what needs to be done but need to simply be empowered
- That kids want to do what's right and good but they need a village to believe in them
- What we teach in LAMC/YLA is not rocket science but we frame it in a different way that makes it more understandable
- There are many needs...but we have the people here in Madison County that can and are meeting those needs
- We need to listen and care about one another
